Blooming Anyway

One of our 2020 Earth Care goals was to wave eco-friendly palms on Palm Sunday. (Eco-palms are produced and sold in a way that protects valuable forests and improves living conditions for those who harvest.) These plans, with so many others since COVID hit, had to be canceled. Caring for the earth wasn't canceled though. Instead, the lilies donated for Easter will not be thrown into the trash. They will be planted on the church grounds to remember the author of re-birth. (Please see the information in this newsletter and come help plant.)

For a while longer, congregational singing will be sacrificed for safety. Oh, how we miss the hymns sung together as one body and the choir! And yet, since March 2020 over 30 people have contributed their musical gifts—many multiple times—in diverse and wonderful ways.

These are just two examples of how this congregation has not just endured these past 13 months—you have turned challenges into opportunities to produce new fruit.

This has been a time of unique challenge and frustration. We are all weary of the restrictions. Those who have filled leadership roles in the church through this time are weary of difficult decisions. Since March of 2020, the Session has met 31 times. It was especially hard in the beginning when suddenly, in addition to all the regular work of the church, we had to figure out how to worship, fellowship, education, clean, collect offerings, and serve the community wisely, safely, and faithfully during a pandemic.

As things improve and new decisions are required, it is hard again. There is no one correct answer in balancing the competing needs of safety and community. On the Illinois Department of Health website, there is a small section entitled "How Do We Move to the Next Phase." The criteria for moving to Phase 5 struck me: "Postpandemic: Vaccine, effective and widely available treatment, or the elimination of new cases over a sustained period of time through herd immunity or other factors." We will be at this task for a while still. So, stay patient; stay kind, stay prayerful, and stay creative!



The remaining 60% is used to support children-at-risk, youth, and young adults through ministries of the Presbyterian Mission Agency.

This year, CPJ committee chose the Child Advocacy Center (CAC) for McHenry County to be the recipient of 40% of our collection. The Center serves children who are the victims of sexual abuse and extreme physical abuse. Representatives from the CAC will be with us at worship on May 2 to give a brief presentation on the services provided.


May Update from the Deacons

Happy 175th Birthday to Us! Our Mission and Service

The First Presbyterian Church of Woodstock is 175 years old! This month's article is Part I for our history of mission and service.

If "a church is measured by what it does for others," as is stated in the 1980 "Brief History of First Presbyterian Church," then FPC has measured up well. The 1946 Centennial program states, "In the past years, men and women have gone out from this church into active missionary work in this country and across the seas." In the early years, the women's groups led the way in mission and service. "Second-mile giving" was directed to missions nationally and internationally.

FPC women also were instrumental in establishing the Woodstock Food Pantry and the Clothing Closet. FPC took actions in 1988 that helped establish Public Action to Deliver Shelter (PADS) in Woodstock/McHenry County. While FPC was on Calhoun Street, homeless were our guests every Thursday for lunch and to hunker down during the day. FPC also helped start WACM (Woodstock Area Community Ministries) to help people in financial crisis. Our support of the Food Pantry continues through donations and staffing, and members serve on the WACM board and as volunteers.

Beginning in the 1990s and continuing for about 15 years, multigenerational groups from the church repaired houses and apartments for Rockford Urban Ministries. Mission service trips also were made to Kentucky and Chicago. The desire to serve others resulted in multiple trips by church members and families to the Gulf Coast, D'Iberville, Mississippi, and Houston to aid hurricane victims and to towns in Illinois hit by tornadoes.

April Session Highlights

The Health Department inspected our property on April 11, 2021. The building was fine. Repairs were made to the septic line.

A solicitation from a law firm advising that IDOT may be seeking to acquire part of our

property for road widening was referred to Ministry Support committee.

Session received a report from the COVID Taskforce and asked them to to collaborate with Ministry Support Committee to develop a thorough and complete plan for reopening to be considered at May Session meeting.

Education and Spiritual Growth request to study the book Dusk, Night, Dawn by Anne Lamott was approved

Ministry Support reported that the sound system has been upgraded to improve live streaming and virtual worship experiences. The new sound board, and PCs have been installed in the A/V booth. Session also the use of undesignated memorial funds to pay for sound booth improvements if contributions do not cover the cost.

After a discussion about church communication systems, tools and responsibilities, Congregational Life will begin to develop a plan to document our systems and tools and consider how they may be enhanced.

The Finance Team asked Session begin to think about options for capital expenditures as a target for approximately \$145,000 unused MCCullough distribution funds.

Session approved continuing education expenses for Pastor Cindy along with a \$200 donation to Luther Seminary for sponsoring the Festival of Homiletics that Cindy will be attending.

Session will be watching Dr. Kathryn Threadgill's video presentation "The Seven Marks of a Vital Congregation" for discussion at the May meeting.
