The Queen's English

On Sunday, a few of us gathered at **Stronghold Camp & Retreat Center** for the Olde English Faire. 'Twas a grand time of merriment, with many people speaking in an English dialect that has largely disappeared. Two of my children were appointed as "protectors of the realm" by none other than Queen Elizabeth I. I noted that the year on the certificate read 1574, so that would explain the language we heard around us.

Our language does change over time, and the church sometimes needs to adapt. A challenging question is this: How much do we need to change to be "relevant" to the culture, and how much do we need to hold firm to our traditions? One area where we do change and update language is in our reading of Scripture. Many of us may have grown up using only the King James Version of the Bible with its abundance of "thees" and "thous." The KJV came out in 1611 (not long after my children met the Queen, apparently.) Our language has changed greatly over the 400+ years since, and the words of the KJV are often difficult to understand. For example, how many of us know what the sentence "I trow not" means? (Answer: "I don't believe so.") And while Jesus was known to "sup" with His disciples in the KJV, today "sup" is much more commonly a greeting. ("What's up?" has become simply "sup?")

While there are some verses for which the KJV's poetry will likely always remain meaningful — "it came to pass in those days" has a certain ring, doesn't it? — newer translations are much easier to comprehend for modern ears. It is also true that more modern translations are often truer to the original manuscripts in Hebrew and Greek, as scholars have found earlier copies and have done greater study of the culture and language. In worship, we are now generally using the Common English Bible, which was published in 2011. When I was in seminary, the commonly preferred translation there was the New Revised Standard Version, which was published in 1989. Another type of Bible we sometimes use is a paraphrase — which renders concepts from the original languages using creative analogies from modern times. A prominent example of a paraphrase is The Message. When preparing a sermon, I often read a handful of translations of the scripture passage, to see how different translators rendered the passage.

There are hundreds of English translations of the Bible. So, what Bible translation is your favorite? Drop me a note and tell me what it is and why. I'd love to hear from you!




Highway Cleanup



October 2, 2022 is World Wide Communion Sunday

As we circle the Communion table, we celebrate with believers throughout the world on this, the first Sunday of October.

The first celebration of World Wide Communion Sunday occurred at Shadyside Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh, PA, in 1933 where Dr. Hugh Thompson Kerr served as pastor. Celebration of World Wide Communion Sunday was adopted as a denominational practice in the Presbyterian Church (US) in 1936, and churches in other denominations were invited to celebrate with us from the beginning. It wasn't until 1940 when the celebration extended to a number of churches around the



world and the practice became widespread. Today, World Communion Sunday is celebrated around the world, demonstrating that the church founded on Jesus Christ peacefully shares God-given goods in a world increasingly destabilized by globalization and global market economies based on greed.

World Communion Sunday is also a time when we receive the annual Peace and Global Witness Offering as a way of continuing the ancient Christian practice of sharing what we have with brothers and sisters in need.

Our intergenerational Christmas decorating party will follow the worship service on *Sunday, November* 20. The morning of decorating will include crafts and activities for all age groups, as we get into the spirit of the Advent season.
