Poinsettia Care 101

The Poinsettia, often referred to as the "Christmas Plant," was first brought to the United States from its native land Mexico, in 1825 by the first US ambassador Joel Robert Poinsett. Today, with the multitude of colors, from the familiar red to other vibrant hues, as well as sizes and shapes available, poinsettias offer an abundance of holiday cheer for every decor.



Here are some tips for keeping Poinsettias looking great through the New Year and beyond:

I. Temperature

When you walk out of the store with your poinsettia, remember that the plant needs protection from the weather, especially if the temperature is freezing. Poinsettias should not be exposed (even in the wrapping) to freezing conditions for more than a short trip to the car. Do not leave your poinsettia in your car while you finish shopping. If the poinsettia is chilled below 50°F it may begin to drop the leaves. Immediately unwrap your poinsettia when you arrive at your destination. Keeping the plant in the paper sleeve for more than 24 hours will cause the leaves to droop and may turn yellow before the season is over.

2. Light

At home, place your plant in a spot with bright natural light. If it is in a sunny location, make sure the plant never dries out. Do not place your plant in an area that is exposed to drafts, or heat from appliances, radiators, or ventilation ducts.

3. Water

The soil should be kept evenly moist. Do not let the soil dry out completely. Empty any water that drains into the container under your plant; if you let the plant sit in this water, the leaves will yellow and drop. The color of your poinsettia will last longer with temperatures not over $75^{\circ}F$ during the day and $60^{\circ}-65^{\circ}F$ at night.

HAVE YOU HEARD ABOUT OUR DIAPER DISTRIBUTION PROJECT?

A year ago, in January 2022, the Compassion Peace & Justice committee within our church began a new local mission project to distribute diapers to families in need.



The pandemic has upended global supply chains and

created a run on many products, including diapers. Two of the country's largest diaper manufacturers, have increased the prices of baby products and typical families will spend \$70 to \$80 on each child's diapers every month, with prices expected to continue to rise. We are partnering with the <u>Woodstock Food Pantry</u> and <u>the Diaper Bank</u> of Northern Illinois (McHenry) to distribute diapers the first Wednesday of each month from 4:00 p.m.– 5:30 p.m. at our church. The Diaper Bank supplies our diapers, and requires our clients to show identification for proof of McHenry County residence, and a SNAP, WIC or LINK card to demonstrate need. A referral from the Food Pantry is also accepted.

The program is gaining momentum and serving more families as word spreads about this new initiative. At our first distribution in January 2022 there were no visitors. At our most recent distribution in December, we supplied 742 diapers for 15 children. Total diapers distributed in 2022 were 4,958. It's exciting to think about how many children and families we might serve in 2023!



Finance Team Report for January Newsletter

We are blessed that contributions are basically keeping pace with the annual budget – THANK YOU! Due to expenses being favorable to the budget we anticipate not needing all the planned transfer of funds from the McCullough Distribution.

We also anticipate having sufficient cash in our operating account, as planned, that will help offset the unfavorable net income for 2022.

About \$9,000 of the favorable YTD expenses are due to lower than budgeted Building & Grounds expenses with the balance of favorable expenses spread across most of the other entities.

Session met with Finance in December to discuss the 2023 Operating Budget which we anticipate being approved in early January. Based upon current and anticipated pledges for the 2023 budget, we are facing a large deficit which will require additional funding, larger than what was transferred from the Mccullough Distribution Fund, from another source to fund the operation of your church. Please pray to God for personal guidance regarding our financial situation and for God's support to session for their leadership of our church's ministries.

Memorial Tree

A small evergreen tree has been planted on the church grounds in memory of **Marty Sobczak**. The tree is located along the church entrance road from the Justice Hill subdivision near the east edge of our property. It is a spruce, a favorite tree of Marty's. A movable plaque will soon be placed near the foot of the tree. Marty was a member of First Presbyterian Church in Woodstock from 1997 until his passing in 2021. He had been a deacon, a Sunday School teacher, member of the choir, active part of the mission committee, and a long-term class member of both the adult Sunday School class and the men's Bible study group. He perhaps is most remembered for his active leadership of countless mission trips to Rockford, Kentucky, the Gulf Coast and elsewhere, as well as securing and stocking the church's mission trailer. Greatly missed and remembered!

December Session Notes

Nominating Committee: The committee found one person for the 2023 Nominating Committee and is waiting on responses from potential elders and deacons. **Mark Bundick** had agreed to lead the committee of session to work on long-term issues.

Compassion, Peace and Justice: Session discussed ways to further promote the Diaper Bank, including working with the Woodstock Food Pantry, promotion to D200 preschool parents, and flyers displayed at the Workforce Network.

Ministry Support: Personnel is recommending 5% increases for staff; these would not take effect until the annual reviews are complete. A proposal to have the accompanist report to the worship arts director instead of the pastor will require changing the job description. Session would review the revised description and take a vote on it at a future meeting.

Ministry Support: Finance: An initial look at the 2023 budget shows an \$85,000 deficit based on pledged income down by \$10,000 and expenses up \$25,000. The deficit amount also assumes a \$50,000 allocation from the McCullough Distribution Fund. Session members will review the presented figures for their committees and send any revisions or comments Pastor Eric set a called session meeting to finalize the budget for Thursday, January 5, 2023.
